

Made by our Members




Mark Voigt showed two projects he made for his wife: a jewelry box and a "forever Valentine" tray. The jewelry box was Mark's first "live edge" piece, made out of walnut, with maple keys. All corner cuts are at 22 ½°, resulting in small 45° wedges for the corners. The technique allows for continuous grain pattern around the entire box. Corners are reinforced with decorative 8° dovetails instead of simple splines. It has three insert trays out of vertical grain fir and a lacquer finish. The top of the box is a piece Mark almost threw out—one more reason to squirrel things away for a project. The box relied on techniques Mark learned in class with Mike Pekovich.



Mark also showed a tray with a heart-shaped image in the wood. After resawing the board, he glued up the pieces to create the heart shape.

Tim DuBois showed a drawered wall shelf that also relied on techniques and design aspects from Mike Pekovich's class. Tim used proud dovetails (to hide errors in the shadows created, as Pekovich suggested). The drawers have Shaker peg pulls and walnut dowels Tim made. He finished it with 4-6 coats of shellac, then used a paste wax thinned slightly to rub out the shine. He is considering hanging the shelf with a French cleat or screwing it directly onto the wall.



APRIL MEETING—SLAB FLATTENING



We had a great turnout at the April meeting. After a short business meeting we got right into the demo for the night. Mark and John Voigt (cousins) demonstrated the TrueTrac router gantry system for flattening slabs. This system has been under construction and in testing in our shop since late last year. Thanks to Mark and John Voigt for seeing it through to completion.

Mark described the set up in our shop and passed along what has been learned about operating it. The gantry system is mounted on a torsion box skinned in Baltic birch plywood. The router in use is a Freud. A bit with replaceable blades handles the actual cutting. One of the portable Oneida dust collectors does a great job keeping the dust at bay.

Build a Miter Fold & Veneered Box with Bob Van Dyke- 3 days

If you have ever done any re-sawing then you know how cool a book matched panel can be. When you incorporate veneers into your work the possibilities for creating spectacular patterns are almost endless! Bookmatching is the simple one- but what about radial matching or "book & butt"? In this hands-on class students will each make a small "Miter Fold" box out of walnut and while doing that we will explore the endless possibilities of working with veneer to create a striking top for the box.



Making Tablesaw Jigs & Fixtures with Bob Van Dyke-3 days

October 27, 28, & 29, 2022 Instructor—Bob VanDyke Fee: \$450 + materials

The idea of making jigs and fixtures for the tablesaw is always one that creates a lot of debate. Some people insist that they are not worth it and "just do it by hand" while other people love coming up with intricate fixtures that do a specific job really well. Bob's approach is somewhere in the middle- will the jig be useful enough to be used over & over again and is it better than one that can be easily purchased? This class is Not a beginning tablesaw class. Participants must have some working experience with tablesaws & routers. Note: because of the design of the jigs for the table saw you must have a table saw with a Biessemeyer type fence (i.e., Sawstop, Jet, Powermatic). Bench top or



"Job site" saws will not work with these jigs. Specify type of saw you own when registering.




