At our February meeting Fr. Lew Grobe and Michael Roske gave us a presentation about the St. John's Abbey Woodshop. It was very interesting to learn the history of the Abbey and how the woodshop came to be a very important part of the campus. The woodshop serves both a very functional and spiritual need for the Abbey. Functional in the means of building furniture and other wooden needs around the campus. Spiritual in the means of "Ora et labora" or "pray and work" meaning combining contemplation with action. I anticipate there will be plenty for us to learn and apply to our own projects.

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
Trimming Chair Legs – Glenn Street, 2/21/2020

Cutting chair legs so that all four sit flush on a flat surface can be challenging. I found I could do this more confidently and consistently by partially cutting through the four chair legs using a guide that kept a Japanese saw blade parallel to the floor and at a constant height. I placed the chair on a flat surface with one leg through a hole in the blade guide: drilled piece of sheet goods. I sawed part way through this leg towards the edge of the leg that was in contact with the flat surface. This partial cut kept the chair level as I continued on and partially cut the other three legs. I then flipped the chair and finished cutting through all four legs.


Before using this technique, if you have a chair that rocks—not all four legs touch—you can temporarily adhere a small spacer beneath one or more of the legs to level the chair.

This technique can also be used to intentionally raise the front of the seat by temporarily adhering spacers beneath the front legs. Doing so will result in more being taken off the back legs than front legs—raising the front of the seat. Temporarily adhering spacers beneath the back legs instead will have the opposite effect; lower the front of the seat.

February Meeting

For our February meeting, four new members introduced themselves with John Kislinger showing his Kids Table. It was a well-built table out of pine with an epoxy finish on the top.



The presenters for the meeting were Michael Roske and Fr. Lou Grobe from the Saint John's Abbey Woodshop. They presented a brief history of the SJA Woodshop. Its start in the 1850's makes it the oldest established woodshop in Minnesota. The shop is a certified sustainable shop, using sustainably harvested wood from the SJ Abbey forests. The primary wood types harvested are red and white oak, pine and maple, with the introduction of walnut trees about 25 years ago which will be harvested at some time in the future. SJ Abbey is a Benedictine Abbey and stewardship and sustainability are large parts of the rule of Benedict which they follow. They use the woodshop as part of the formation process for young monks to give them experience with "working with their hands", being part of the formation process. The woodshop is also a place that CSB and SJU students can experience working with their hands both through work-study and volunteering. In addition to monastic and students, the woodshop has a fairly large number of volunteers that donate their time in many different ways to the woodworking process. Michael and Lou gave a presentation showing a few of the types of pieces built in the woodshop including doors, chairs, tables and many other items. Most of the

pieces are used within the Abbey, college and prep school, though many are available through the Abbey Gift Shop and University Bookstore. They invest a lot of time in the making of display and storage

cabinets for the Saint John's Bible reproductions with a recent venture in building large pipes for part of the enlargement process for the Abbey Church organ.
